

Anthem: "Come Messiah, Come Emmanuel"

According to The Emily Post Institute, the making of introductions is an important skill for creating a good impression and for making connections. Among the Institute's tips for making strong introductions are these:

1) Speaking clearly, 2) Using names and titles, and 3) Starting a conversation

The world's introduction to Jesus began with prophetic scriptures long before Jesus was born. "The virgin will be with child and will give birth to a son and will call him Immanuel." Isaiah 7:14b

The first personal introduction to Jesus was foretold as coming from a voice in the wilderness declaring: "Prepare the way for the Lord." Isaiah 40:3a --Matthew 3 identifies the voice to be that of John the Baptizer.

John's own introduction included that Jesus would give the Holy Spirit to people in a way John could not: "... after me will come one who is more powerful than I, whose sandals I am not fit to carry. He will baptize you with the Holy Spirit and with fire." Matthew 3:11

The Spirit of God introduced Jesus following Jesus' baptism by descending like a dove and lighting on Jesus: "And a voice from heaven said, 'This is my Son, whom I love; with him I am well pleased." Matthew 3:17

These introductions to Jesus hold true to making a lasting impression and creating a human connection:

- 1) The message is spoken clearly in both the Old and New Testaments
- 2) Names and titles are used the Lord, Immanuel, my Son
- 3) A conversation is started Jesus fulfills God's plan of redemption and salvation. This is the most important conversation of all time for all people.

Prayer: Heavenly Father, thank you for introducing us to Jesus, our Redeemer and Messiah.
